The Emotions Show

Poets in domesticity


Clare Cowley has created a series of paintings that portray poets in domestic environments. These are people that she has met and befriended within her own practise as an artist and musician, that she felt a need to understand on a deeper level through painting. She notes that poets are typically private and reserved people, whose public personas are connected to their performances. Cowley has sought to capture the hidden part of their lives to learn more about what they are like when they could not hide behind their words or performative routines. These paintings depict the moment Cowley meets the subjects within their surroundings, be it in their own homes or in Cowley's studio. Each work captures the unique lights, colours and objects that assume the space at the time they meet. The imagery is all about being present in the same space as the subjects, and experiencing the unique emotional experience as they reveal themselves in an interior and intimate space. Perpetual holiday

Nick Drake needed an escape from the monotony he sometimes felt when painting, and decided to make the subject matter of his work a literal escape; a holiday to a friend's beachside property he frequented when he was younger. The imagery in Drake's work is tinged with nostalgia and his fantasy of remaining forever on holiday. Cold beers, mojitos, and kite surfing are the insignia of a man longing for his youth, where the responsibilities he now faces were an afterthought left for another day. Drake's trip back in time was ironically difficult to orchestrate because of the constraints faced by adults with full time jobs, and responsibilities to partners and children. It ended up being a fleeting journey, and seems ultimately insufficient to satiate Drake's desire for escapism. He therefore plans further works about travel. Given his difficultly getting away in this instance, his work is just as much be about his inability to leave as well as the travel itself. This intensifies the sense of longing he sought to achieve in his current work. (Nicole Gillard)

Know yourself

Sofia Choi's work documents her past struggles to understand her emotions, making art related to her past experience. In this series of works, Choi looks back to a time of transition in her own life: between when she didn't know herself, and when she did. During this transition she had to interrogate her beliefs in order to find her identity. "Why do I need to be kind?" "Why do I need others to like what I look like?" "Why do I think these thoughts?" But there was a problem: Choi found that she was making excuses in answer to the questions, which she describes as being "shameful, and hidden-away". Her paintings document how these excuses were moulding her mind, and then how she threw the excuses out of her, and then when she discovered her identity. (Sofia Choi)


Apricot Flower 2017
























