In this exhibition, Donna Wright, Katrin Terton and Donna McDonald show their different and highly personal interpretations of the everywhere world. Their themes range across the potency of cultural memories; our instinctive connections with nature; and the urgency of the city. Through their works, they reveal traces of lost childhoods; the yearning to touch the earth beneath their feet and all it holds—skin, feathers, bones; and the struggle to reconcile tensions between nature and city.

Donna Wright's watercolour on timber series of works, 'Adventures of Dog and Girl', initially evokes innocent memories of childhood fairy tales, before going more deeply into a world of competing desires, discontents, restlessness and longing. Like all good story-telling adventurers, Donna reaches her inevitable destination.

Katrin Terton's mixed-media works continues her focus on the tenuous and transient elements of our environment, with all its possibilities of transformation. Katrin maintains the nature of the materials as much as possible in her works, keeping them as raw, fragile and broken as they are. While Katrin's works are overtly tactile, they hint at unreachable secrets.

Donna McDonald's images connote the tensions between her internal world and her urban environment. By investigating the processes and media of visual arts imagemaking, Donna signals the noise and press of her city-life, while yearning for serenity and quietude.

Through their diverse images of the visible everywhere world, these three artists reflect upon what it means to be truly present in our lives, every day ... everywhere.

Title | Adventures of Dog and Girl Artist | Donna Wright

Dog, the eternal wanderlust; everywhere wandering. Dog is the restless rover, the rambler, the voyager. Fuelled by discontent and desire, dreaming of future fortunes, Dog is always on the move. Girl holds tight our cultural memory; she garners and gathers generations past. Girl grows heavy with the tales of yesteryear's adventurous ways. She wistfully dreams of one place, one belonging. Girl, the gleaner, picks her way through the remnants left scattered in Dog's wake. She is burdened with reminiscence, unable to rest, there is no respite. Forever tied to Dog's roving ways, Girl slips into place. Then, one morning sky, Girl wakes to Dog's distant heels. And for the first time, uncluttered of time and place, Girl turns to look in on herself, and there she finds what she has always been searching for.

Donna Wright has been an independent practising visual artist and teacher for over twenty-five years. Donna's art practice explores the impacts of cultural memory, its residues and movements across generations, the part it plays in evoking feelings of longing, belonging and reconnection, and its aesthetic influences on the way we perceive, shape and engage in the world around us.



Title | Everywhere wanderings and wonders Artist | Katrin Terton

Katrin Terton's work has a strong focus on the ever changing and transient elements of the environment, on transformation and impermanence. She is drawn to nature's discards and other found objects that are often overlooked by others. For the artist these are small everyday wonders and a constant source of inspiration, to be found anywhere while she wanders the world.

Viewers often find the use of organic materials like snake skin sheds, human hair, disintegrating bones both compelling and confronting as it evokes thoughts around our own vulnerability, life and death and how we feel about changes within and around us throughout time.

All gathered materials and found objects have their own individual history; their journeys are told in the marks and scars that catch Katrin's attention. The quality of discovery is an essential component of her work which is mainly process oriented. It is the element of unpredictability in the materials that intrigues her.

Each piece has its own natural momentum. Memories, reflections and emotions get inexplicitly caught up in the materials' past. The works then are as transient as the materials themselves, yet like the original forms they are created from, their content remains resilient, personal and adaptable. Katrin always aims to leave enough untold to inspire the imagination of those who cross their path.

German-born artist and art-therapist Katrin Terton migrated to Australia in 2001 and now lives and works at the Sunshine Coast. She is currently developing a new body of work for a sensory art exhibition – *Beyond Sight* – accessible for blind, vision-impaired and sighted people alike. Any proceeds from Katrin's work on show will go towards this project.



Title | (Sub)Urban Tensions Artist | Donna McDonald

Donna McDonald's mixed media series, 'Talking Back to Diane Arbus' (2015-2016; exhibited at WAG Upstairs in June 2016), reflected her concerns about the personal identity and socio-political implications of the visual arts representations of people with disability.

In this series of works—influenced by Jung's writings about art, aesthetics and expression of the soul, and by David Hockney's playful attitudes to art-making—Donna continues her concerns about personal identity by exploring the tensions between her internal world and her urban environment.

Using an expressionist style in a range of media, Donna signals the noise and press of her city-life, while yearning for serenity and quietude.

Her images include real and imagined scenes from her life in her home suburb of Albion (Brisbane). Some of her images attenuate her occasional longing to be out of the city bustle while other images reflect her acceptance of the tensions between city, nature and self.

Donna McDonald is a developing artist, creative arts researcher and art psychotherapy student. She is curious about the role of the creative arts in effecting change—be it change in the individual person creating the artwork or the person viewing the artwork. While Donna understands—and indeed, has experienced—the health and wellbeing impacts of artmaking, she is also working towards an improved understanding of the role of the creative arts in politics and social change.




