
Psalm 19:1-2 states, "The heavens declare the glory of God; the sky displays His handiwork. Day after day it speaks out; night after night it reveals His greatness".

design to keep the focus on the face. However the gold outline is to represent how these emotions can run through us in our everyday life.




**Devolved Development, 2021 Jasmine Choi & Justin Carlisle**Acrylic Paint and Ink on the

Eyes of The Cat, 2021 Minjee Kim Acrylic Paints 30.5 x 40.5 x 1.5 cm | NFS

The cat will see its stunning orange fur as plain black and white. 38 x 25.4 x 41 cm | NFS





The disappearance of street vendors carrying loads of commodities on their baskets and walking around the city to sell their goods gave me a culture shock. A nap is rare to people in Australia, but to poor labourers who work constantly to

make money, a nap is even more precious. I painted a street vendor napping on her arm while waiting for customers. The baskets full of fruits in front of a single bicycle emphasise the woman's poverty. The warm coral background portrays the heat of the summer that the woman suffers through.

Spring is a time of rebirth, renewal and awakening. By choosing typical elements of spring, I intend to convey the sense of freshness and brightness


through the impressionism form of an oil painting. Through this artwork I hope the audience can feel the beauty of spring.

## Rejuvenation & Conservation, 2021 Olivia Colstick

The first detailed artwork of my two-part series displayed manipulates my prior knowledge from the Moreton Island experience to communicate a message of impact and reason. I was inspired by many photos I had taken from around the beautiful island but also noticed the continuous damage over the years due to human-directed bush fires, erosion and climate change.

Despite this negative view of destruction, I wanted my artwork to shift one's perspective from a negative to a positive by showcasing a healthy hidden cove at Moreton Island with clear, clean blue water surrounded by luscious vibrant greenery. This illustrated hope and achievability that nature can rejuvenate instead of dwelling on what has already been damaged.

Alternatively, this bubble wrap illusion, the second of the two-part series, demonstrates the urge for conservation of Moreton Island once it has been rejuvenated. By using the bubble wrap effect the idea of protection is portrayed quite literally and shows an alternate way of preserving nature. The overall message my artwork demonstrates is the actuality of the rejuvenation of nature at Moreton Island and its importance of being conserved. My artwork aims to convey that it is possible to achieve this.



Who was Jesus? Was he just a man? Is it just a name? What value does this name hold to you? To me, the name Jesus holds great significance. When I hear this name, I feel at peace. All of my worries and anxious thoughts cease for that moment. He takes them away from me. So through this gift I have been given, I decided to portray all of these emotions in the eyes of Jesus Himself. I wanted

to create an artwork that felt so real, as if you were looking into His eyes. As if He was standing right in front of you. The reference photo for this painting is from the show called *The Chosen*, which depicts the life story of Jesus and how He began His ministry. This show gives the perfect representation of the character of Jesus, so I painted this character so that people could see Him how I see Him.

Daydream, 2021 Sophie Geeves Oil on Canvas 91.5 x 61 x 3.5 cm | \$100



Focusing on the allegory of growth, this artwork displays a contemplating biomorphic of a subliminal reality. The critical thinking shown behind this artwork is seen in the art techniques used to exhibit realism. By combining images and concepts from the Moreton Island experience, this artwork is used to represent the notions of emotion and growth by coalescing my focus of environmental aspects to reflect personal convictions. The sunset represents the beauty in development to enlighten every

detail and bring splendor to what we don't see in ourselves. The trees represent the garden growing in our hearts, which is where our personality and emotions belong. Trees may flourish and trees may die, but the things that stand are our foundational beliefs about ourselves and the world around us. The waves represent the motions of life as good times come and go. And as the light from the sun glistens on the water, dark times can still come as seen in the darkness of the underside inside a wave.



Hidden Behind, 2021 Ming Li Acrylic on Canvas 45 x 92 cm | \$75

Hidden behind explores how individual trepidation can be portrayed visually and resonate emotional responses. I'm scared of what awaits in the mysterious afterlife with its uncertainty and the potential eternal suffering. This fear is embodied in metaphorical language by a Buddha, the symbolism of the eastern spiritual world, sneaking inside a closet. This eerie juxtaposition uses the condescending being to represent how death would be glaring at you until its inevitable arrival. The dread it brings is identical with how there is always that shuddering feeling that your closet is hosted by wickedness. That limbo of curiosity and fear for the unknown is like the ominous anxiety when thinking that I might eventually face some suffering after death. Hidden behind conveys that fear by merging symbolism with found-footage and impressionism to blur the boundary between reality and subconscious, thus bringing this ambiguous fear a physical form.

Change is unavoidable and constant, forever imposing itself upon us; whether it be through nature, the lives of friends and family or a global pandemic. Change leads to change, an incessant flow in our web of existence. Observations of the ceaseless transformation of the Moreton Island

landscape inspired me to examine how external change personally affects me. My artwork explores the flow of change associated with global warming: modern life, leading to carbon pollution, causing climate change, adversely affecting nature; ultimately leading me to examine my personal lifestyle.

We can often be our own emotional manipulator by using a tough exterior to conceal the truths within ourselves. The way we choose to carry out our lives can greatly mask the demons holding us back inside. Anxiety can be the hardest battle to overcome and the

struggles of such constraints can prevail for years to come. So, the only way to overcome such times is to uncover your mask, open the windows of your soul and let people in who can guide you out of the dark hole, swallowing you up.


