
Drift

These images are generative by different sets of rules, changing and moving freely under a predefined logic. They are deterministic (as they follow the rules) and yet unpredictable (as they change at random).

With the advancement of visual programming tools, we can create art in new ways and connect math and logic to art and imagination. Programmers become creative coders who express ideas and experiences using modern technologies. It is fascinating to see how a simple Sin function can generate so many beautiful patterns and motions! Technologies are the collective wisdom of people, and that allows me to create "Drift."
